The Central Kentucky Chapter (Coordinator Lisa Kepl) celebrated their 16th Birthday. It was also a celebration of the retirement of coordinator MaryAnn Overturf, one of the chapter founders and chapter coordinator for 16 years!



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Coordinator Corner:

Penny Sweet is the coordinator for the New River Valley/Radford, VA Project Linus Chapter. Penny first heard about Project Linus in the Spring of 2000 from Sandy Wyatt, the PL coordinator for Rockingham County NC at the time, and Sandy's mother Ruth Cummins, who was the coordinator for the Chatham, VA chapter in 2000. Penny is in her 18th year as coordinator. The chapter includes the cities of Radford, Blacksburg, and Christiansburg and Floyd, Pulaski and Giles counties. In 18 years, the chapter has made and delivered over 38,500 blankets.



The chapter has three Make-a-Blanket Days every Spring, Summer and Fall. These are held at a local Methodist church where the church donates their facility which includes lots of free parking and a large kitchen to use. Volunteers provide food for the event and Penny brings drinks and paper products. Each event has over 100 attendees including students from Virginia Tech and Radford University. Many volunteers bring blankets to donate and they stay to sew on tags, make fleece blankets, work on knitted/crocheted blankets, and more. Each day usually results in 300-400 blanket donations.

Penny makes most of the blanket deliveries herself with help from her assistant Laura who works in Blacksburg. The chapter provides 150-200 blankets a month including to 2 large hospitals, 2 small hospitals and many other agencies including Hospice, schools, Head Start centers, social services and community services.

The chapter gets great support from the local JoAnn's which has been a drop off point for 18 years. Both universities have been supportive including sororities and fraternities who have held fundraisers, blanket drives and their own Make-a-Blanket days.

Penny attributes her chapter's success to the hundreds of volunteers that have helped over the years. One wonderful lady is Regina who makes most of the weighted blankets. There has been an increase in the need for these blankets for children with autism and other illnesses. Regina often customizes these using the child's favorite pattern and/or color. Last year she made over 80 weighted blankets.

Penny has lived in Radford, VA with her husband Tim since they were married in 1964. Penny is originally from Connecticut and went to school in Pittsburgh. She is a retired Registered Nurse and worked as a Psychiatric Nurse for 35 years. Penny and Tim have 2 daughters and 3 grandchildren who live in northern Virginia and Washington, D.C. Penny and Tim enjoy visiting their children and grandchildren and trips to Ocean Isle Beach in N.C.

Penny, like many of the Project Linus coordinators around the country, is what makes Project Linus a success by ensuring children receive hugs in the form of a handmade blanket while they are facing rough times and traumatic situations.



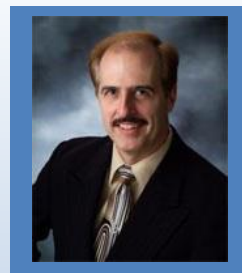

What is the Project Linus Mystery Quilt Challenge? The Mystery Quilt Challenge is a yearly fundraiser for Project Linus. Nine clues are revealed over nine weeks which will give participants very detailed, written and video instructions to complete a beautiful child-sized quilt. All levels of quilting expertise are welcome from novice to experienced!

How much does it cost?

Cost of participating in the Challenge is a \$15.00 tax-deductible donation to Project Linus.

How do I participate?

There will be a weekly "Clue" available online and activated each week on Saturday. Our Mystery Clues page is password protected and only those who have officially registered for the 2018 Challenge will be able to enter.

How do I locate my password and login credentials once I've registered?

Once you register you will receive an email from our webmaster within 48 hours with your personal login credentials (password). Then, you can click on the "Clues Page" link and access the Preparation page which will give you some suggestions for fabrics and items needed for this year's challenge.

Can my local chapter receive my \$15 donation?

Yes! If you would like to specify your local Project Linus chapter as the recipient of your donation, please enter the complete chapter name when you register.

When is the first clue revealed?

The first clue will be revealed on Saturday, September 15, 2018 with Clue #9 - THE BIG REVEAL on Saturday, November 10, 2018.

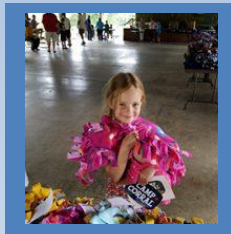
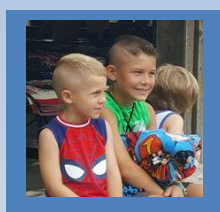


The Pierce, Thurston, Kitsap & Mason counties – WA Chapter (Coordinator Claudia Post) just celebrated delivering 6,000 blankets.

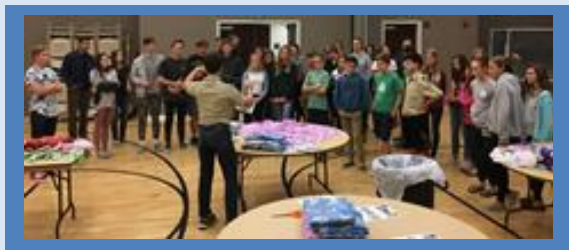
Moving Forward Mary-thon – Mark Your Calendars!

Youth Helping Youth continued

San Diego North County Coastal Chapter (Coordinator Rose Waring): In late January the chapter received a telephone call from Ezra Casalegno, a fourteen year old with Life Rank as a Boy Scout. He wanted to choose Project Linus as the recipient of his final project to complete requirements to become an Eagle Scout, the highest rank attainable in the Scouting Program. On February 3rd we met and discussed his Project. He had already completed a great deal of research and acquired a large group of volunteers to assist him with donations for fabric and hours of labor to produce blankets. He set his goal at fifty blankets and began the activities needed to meet and exceed his goal. He collected and sold cans and bottles, solicited donations from friends and family and added money from his own savings to purchase the necessary supplies. At our suggestion, he created a prototype for his volunteers to follow. He created an assembly line in the gymnasium of his church and in two sessions, a total of 52 beautiful and well-crafted fleece blankets were produced. The bounty was delivered on March 25th by Ezra and his dad. They reported that Ezra had enjoyed the entire process and was pleased to know that 52 children and their families would be comforted by his efforts.



Waco, TX Chapter (Coordinator Sandra Rowell): The chapter participated in the Harker Heights Library Youth Fair.



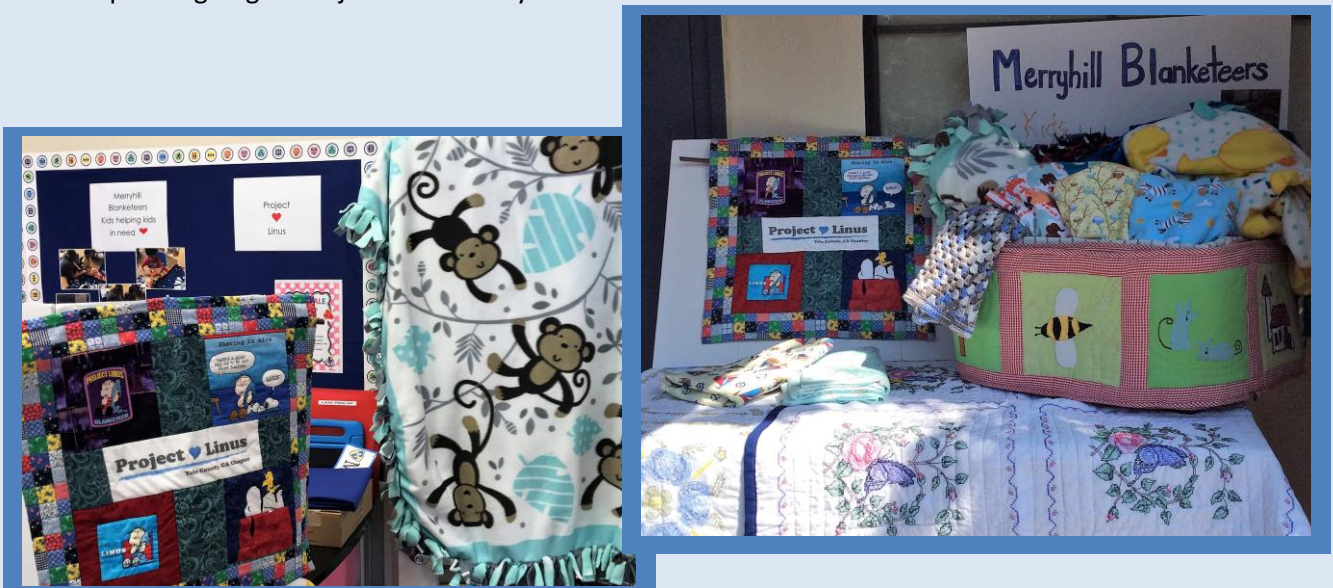

Dear Project Linus,

As I sit in my daughter's room, packing and helping her sort through her things, that she wishes to bring with her to college, out comes the quilt. My daughter received her Project Linus quilt from UMASS memorial hospital's NICU 18 years ago.

She was born 7 weeks early and was so small. The quilt she received was so big compared to her and I couldn't help but giggle a bit when I placed the corner of it on her.

She has loved this quilt and kept it in her room throughout these 18 years. She has never said 'oh put that in my baby box' or 'I don't need it anymore'.

And now today, she says to me mom should I bring my quilt? I'm afraid of it getting ruined and it would kill me. I always measured myself with my quilt and knew that I was getting bigger and then I got bigger than my quilt. I told her that it could stay in her room as we both sat here crying together. Thank you for not only keeping my little girl warm but also for giving me a break from the reality I was facing in the NICU those little giggles were needed. For keeping my daughter's confidence growing, helping her with math and most importantly letting us break down and cry a bit at the next stage of her life!

I want to thank you soooo much for helping and comforting me throughout my baby stages. I got a blanket when I was a baby and I still have it 11 years later. I just want you to know you are helping people a lot more than you know it. I want you to continue on what you are doing and I hope you help many more people like me.

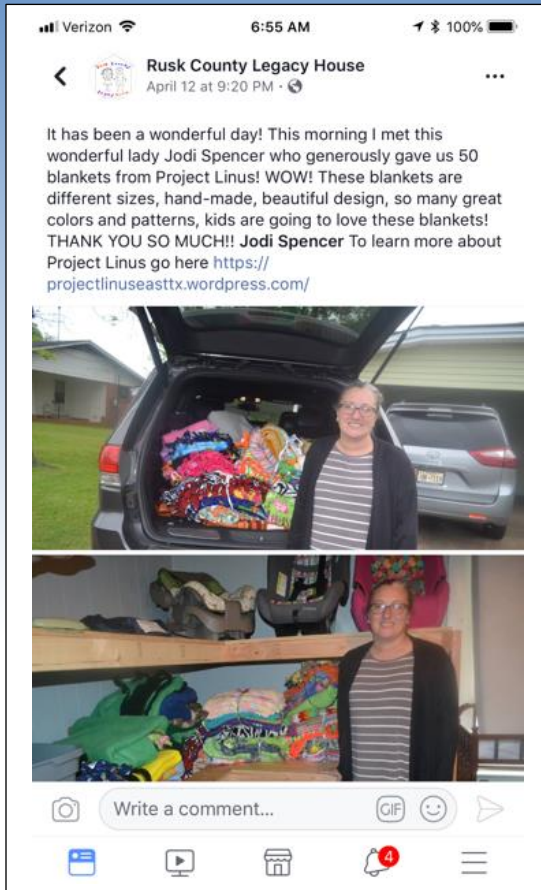
Dear Project Linus,
